By leave, it was agreed for the House to deal with Concurrence and Third Reading of Bills (No. 221) and (No. 300).

Mr. LAGASSÉ moved:

THAT Bill (No. 221) – The Rail Safety Awareness Week Act/Loi sur la Semaine de sensibilisation à la sécurité ferroviaire, reported from the Standing Committee on Private Bills, be concurred in and be now read a Third Time and passed.

And a debate arising,

And Messrs. LAGASSÉ, SWAN, YAKIMOSKI, LINDSEY and MARCELINO (Tyndall Park) having spoken,

And the Question being put. It was agreed to.

The Bill was accordingly concurred in, read a Third Time and passed.

Mrs. GUILLEMARD moved:

THAT Bill (No. 300) – The University of Manitoba Students' Union Amendment Act/Loi modifiant la Loi sur l'Association des étudiants de l'Université du Manitoba, reported from the Standing Committee on Private Bills, be concurred in and be now read a Third Time and passed.

And Mrs. GUILLEMARD and Messrs. TEITSMA and SWAN having spoken,

And the Question being put. It was agreed to.

Mr. GRAYDON moved:

Resolution No. 18: Recognizing Lyme Disease Awareness and Prevention

WHEREAS May is Lyme Disease Awareness Month; and

WHEREAS Lyme disease is caused by a bacterium transmitted in North America by the bite of an infected blacklegged tick, or western blacklegged ticks; and

WHEREAS the highest risk period for Lyme disease in Manitoba is from May to July; and

WHEREAS Lyme disease is difficult to diagnose, currently has no cure, and successful treatment of symptoms can take a long time; and

WHEREAS prevalence of the disease has exploded in Manitoba from one confirmed case in 2009 to twenty-nine confirmed cases in 2017, with many more cases unreported or unconfirmed; and

WHEREAS reported Lyme cases in Canada increased more than six-fold between 2009 and 2016; and

WHEREAS many patients still struggle to get diagnosed and treated; and

WHEREAS the symptoms of Lyme disease can become very severe when left untreated, causing arthritis, heart palpitations, brain inflammation, nerve pain, dizziness, blurred vision, and a compromised immune system.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba urge the Provincial Government to raise awareness of the effects of Lyme disease in Manitoba, encourage better treatment and diagnosis of the infection, and promote prevention strategies.

 - (a) the time this Act was introduced as Bill 26 in the Third Session of the 41st Legislature; and
 - (b) the time the federal Act receives royal assent.
