HON. DUFF ROBLIN (Premier) (Wolseley): Mr. Speaker, before the Orders of the Day I would like to deal with a point concerning the order of business in the Assembly and to say that I have made a suggestion to the Leader of the Opposition and the Leader of the CCF Party that we should give unanimous consent to rearranging the order of business on the Order Paper for Private Members' Day. The suggestion I made to them was that we should move the adjourned debates on Bills and second reading of Bills, all private members' Bills of course, up from the bottom of the resolutions as they are at the present time and put them to the front of the resolutions. This would mean that the Bills would then be on the top of the Order Paper on next private members' day for consideration and that we would not proceed to debate the resolutions until such time as they had been disposed of. My reason for doing that was with the thought in mind that we have had on some of the resolutions at any rate, a pretty extensive debate and that it might be thought advisable to make sure that the private members' Bills which so far have been pretty well buried under the resolutions should come to the top of the Order Paper to make sure that they get a reasonable amount of discussion. The thought behind that, of course, is that these Bills interest the general public very considerably, and that they should have discussion and some of them at any rate will go to Committee and we want to advance that procedure rather than have them wait until all the resolutions are disposed of, seeing that the resolutions are not generally a matter of public interest and referred to Committee the way that Bills are. I think I have consent to that procedure so I would just like to make that suggestion, Sir, and ask for the unanimous consent of the House to make that change in the Order Paper for Private Members' Day next.

MR. SPEAKER: Does the First Minister have the unanimous consent of the House?
Agreed.

MR. ROBLIN: And now, Sir, we have a great many people that are anxious to have the opportunity of attending the Law Amendments Committee, Sir,

MR. RUSSELL PAULLEY (Leader of the CCF) (Radisson): I believe, Mr. Premier, the Honourable Member for St. Boniface has a very vital important announcement to make.

MR. L. DESJARDINS (St. Boniface): Mr. Speaker, I think that it would be appropriate that in view that we're practically holding open house today, and having so many people representing different municipalities as our guests, that at least one municipality or one city should in turn invite the members to be their guests; and this is a pleasure for me to do this evening. Mr. Speaker, in the name of L'Association de St. Jean Baptiste I would invite each and every member of this House to spend an evening as the guest of the proud city of St. Boniface, and I might say that I am assured that the subject of Metro will not be on the agenda. So Mr. Speaker, on Wednesday March 23rd at 8:00 p.m. at the Cercle-Ouvrier, Avenue Cathedral, opposite the St. Boniface Basilica I would like to invite you, Mr. Speaker, and all the members. I am sure that you will be guaranteed a pleasant evening away from politics and you will all be treated to good homemade pea soup.

MR. PAULLEY: Mr. Speaker, as one of those members in this Legislature who has the privilege of representing part of the St. Boniface city, namely that section of Windsor Park and the east generally of the Seine River, I am happy to have the invitation of my honourable friend, the member for St. Boniface, and also the council and the Society of St. Jean Baptiste to add to the words of my honourable friend's invitation to the annual affair. I am sure that the members of this Legislature in the past have enjoyed themselves most fully at this evening. I might say to those members who are new to the legislature and haven't had the
