Campground Tips

- Be Wildlife Smart. Do not feed any wildlife, including birds or squirrels. You are in black bear country secure all attractants such as food, cooking equipment and trash in a locked vehicle. Do not store food or attractants in your tent.
- Practice Leave No Trace.
 Pack out all gear and trash to keep the campsites clean for others.
- Keep dogs on leash and clean up after your pet.
- Learn to recognize and avoid poisonous plants such as poison ivy.
- Open fires are prohibited.
 Use portable stoves or fire pits provided.
- Don't Move Firewood -Moving firewood can spread harmful invasive species and destroy our forests.
- Prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species. Always clean, drain, dry watercraft and water related equipment. Visit manitoba.ca/stopais for full regulations.
- In case of injury or illness contact a Park Attendant or Park Patrol Officer. They can assist you to reach medical help.

Adam Lake Campground

The blue jewel of southwestern Manitoba



Get away and enjoy the day at the blue jewel of southwestern Manitoba - Adam Lake Campground in the Turtle Mountain Provincial Park. The campground is made up of five bays: Hartley, Breadon, Sharpe and Oskar with a total of 42 electrical sites and 36 water and electrical sites. Lakeview Bay, located two kilometres south of the main campground, offers 24 basic sites, one group use area and two basic sites in the equestrian area to accommodate people with horses.

A swimming area, grass volleyball court, baseball diamond and playgrounds are all near the beach and campground, ready for outdoor action. Picnic areas and shelters are located near the beach for a day out by the water. Go for a relaxing canoe trip on shallow Adam Lake.

Try a unique workout on the 2.5 kilometre loop Adam Lake Fitness Trail. Or take a leisurely walk on one of the four hiking trails that start at Adam Lake and vary in length from five kilometres to 15 kilometres. For the more adventurous, bring your own horse and enjoy our equestrian trails. Take the Wildlife Viewing Trail to the viewing tower and watch for moose and white-tailed deer. Listen for the haunting call of loons on the lake.

Adam Lake Campground is located approximately 22 kilometres south of Boissevain, MB just off Hwy #10 or seven kilometres north of the Canada / United States Border.
