Campground Tips

- Be Wildlife Smart. Do not feed any wildlife, including birds or squirrels. You are in black bear country - secure all attractants such as food, cooking equipment and trash in a locked vehicle. Do not store food or attractants in your tent.
- Practice Leave No Trace. Pack out all gear and trash to keep the campsites clean for others.
- Keep dogs on leash and clean up after your pet.
- Learn to recognize and avoid poisonous plants such as poison ivy.
- Open fires are prohibited. Use portable stoves or fire pits provided.
- Don't Move Firewood -Moving firewood can spread harmful invasive species and destroy our forests.
- Prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species. Always clean, drain, dry watercraft and water related equipment. Visit *manitoba.ca/stopais* for full regulations.
- In case of injury or illness contact a Park Attendant or Park Patrol Officer. They can assist you to reach medical help.

Betula Lake Campground

• Wildlife ranging from the mighty Moose to tiny Hummingbirds



Beautiful Betula Lake campground is located beside Betula Lake in the peaceful wilderness of Whiteshell Provincial Park. Choose from 14 electrical campsites, each with outdoor necessities including firepits, picnic tables, washroom facilities and a water supply. For your convenience, a grocery store and gas station are located adjacent to the campground. The boat dock and launch is located on the east shore of Betula Lake.

Everyone can stay active at the playgrounds or the baseball diamond. Pack a picnic and spend the day on the warm sandy beach or enjoy sailing and other water activities.

Get into nature on the Foresters Footsteps Self-guiding Trail and the Betula Lake Bike Trail. Both are within walking distance of the campground. Watch for wildlife ranging from the mighty moose to tiny hummingbirds. The Pine Points Rapids Hiking Trail is located between Nutimik and Betula Lake. This 2.5 kilometre trail takes you through a mixed wood forest and rugged rock outcrop. Fire pits along the trail allow for a quick meal stop.

Don't miss the Bannock Point Petroform site located north of Betula Lake off Provincial Road #307. Look for stones laid out in shapes of snakes, fish and turtles. They are believed to have been made centuries ago by First Nations people for teaching and healing ceremonies.

Betula Lake Campground is located off Provincial Road #307 between White Lake and Nutimik Lake.
